





Library News

I hope that everyone had a great summer and is ready for a fun fall of sewing projects. There are now 10 new books for the library. They will be available at the September meeting. I hope you will take them out as there is little space to store them. I tried to choose an assortment of titles so there should be something of interest to most people.

There is a **Big Book of Baby Quilts**. It has 87 patterns. There are quilts that are easy and some more involved. There are quilts for boys, girls and either. There are pieced and appliquéd designs.

We Love Color is a book of 16 quilt designs by 16 different designers using Kona cotton. The quilts have a modern look that will appeal to teens and young adults.

At the other extreme is the book **At Home with Country Quilts**. It features pieced and appliquéd quilts in warm country colours. There are full sized patterns for traditional and primitive designs.

In between these two are more books with cute ideas, often for smaller projects. They include **Skinny Quilts and Table Runners Vol. 2**, **Quilts from Textured Solids** and **A Batch of Quilt Soup**. The last one also has some recipes.



Back to Charm School offers fun ideas to use charm packs. Many of the projects are small and could easily be made with fabric left over from a big quilt.

For people wanting to try or improve machine quilting, there is **Machine Quilting with Alex Anderson**. It has clear pictures and helpful tips. There are practice projects. If you don't want to machine quilt, the designs in the back of the book are still worth a look.

There is another box of quilt (possible embroidery) designs, **Follow-The-Line Quilting Designs Volume 2**. It has full size patterns for blocks and borders in various sizes. There are 21 different choices. I have listed what is inside on the back of the box.

Finally, we now have the 2nd addition of Joen Wolfrom's book **Color Play**. It is expanded and updated. It features over 100 quilts to view. Bring transparency, luminosity, shadow and depth to your quilts. It features an in depth look at the 24 colours of the colour wheel, including blocks and pictures of fabrics that work together.



Around that time Pat and Johanna got together and did Birds In the Air. It is heavily hand quilted and has more than a few red wine stains.

Pat was in Perth and saw a pattern for Redwork made by Marilyn Crawford. Thinking this was someone she knew she bought the pattern and promptly made a quilt.



When Pat's 2nd son was getting married she gave them the pattern book and they chose Kaleidoscope. Her daughter-in-law is a pastry chef and her son is musical so in the quilt are pastry designs and musical notes.

Autumn came and the "Leaves for Autumn" was created.

Time for an "I Spy Quilt". It was made as a group and took 3 days to cut out all the pieces.

On the back is a panel for her grandson to play cars on.

The "Square in a Square" quilt has golf logos on it as her husband had 75 golf shirts. A Helen Hejinki Inspiration helped with the cardinal quilt, it is machine appliquéd and machine quilted.



Along came the 10th anniversary for the son and daughter-in-law and the "Cathedral Star" was made, totally on the Featherweight machine.




