

Hexi fever has hit. This quilt was made for Judy's Mother who was in Extencicare It has approximately 4,000 hexis.



The Buckhorn Silver Challenge came just in time Judy worked on the Challenges even though she felt the purple and gold piece was BUTT UGLY



Show Report 2016

Well folks, YOU DID IT! I think that our show exceeded all our expectations. We had great weather (a little rain on Saturday did nothing to dampen our visitors' enthusiasm). There were rave reviews about the 187 quilts and quilted items that were displayed. The twoonie draw was successful as they sold out of tickets and 65 people are happier having won something. By all accounts the vendors were happy with sales and the creature comforts that Chris and her team bestowed on them.

Our attendance was around 1200, averaging about 400 per day. This was an increase of approx 300 over the last show. Sixty quilts received a vote for best in show. So many people said they were hard pressed to pick a best in show quilt as they were so impressed by the quality of quilts they were seeing. All the quilted items were beautiful and you should all be very proud.

Kelly DuMaresq was a real hit. She is a very popular teacher and at times it seemed like all her previous pupils came to see her. What a vibrant lovely lady she is!

Many people were impressed by the Memoriam to Marjorie Fawcett. Many of her friends stopped by to see it and comment. The youth quilts and Mrs. Whiteman's quilts were well received also. Rosalie Tennison our quilt appraiser was kept busy and really enjoyed her weekend. She appraised 17 quilts, 12 members quilts and 5 walk-ins.

The Boutique was a going concern all weekend. Many visitors made a return visit after visiting Kelly's building where they saw what one could accomplish with scraps. The box of scraps in the boutique was a popular site. There were so many scraps and the idea was only suggested by Millie 4-5 weeks before the show. Think what we could do with 2 years notice. Start saving girls!

Linda Black spent the weekend in the kitchen with her 2 workers. They fed the vendors and volunteers like royalty. Rave reviews on the food!

I want to thank everyone for their support, the show committee for their hard work and strong support ; the volunteers who worked hard over the weekend doing whatever needed to be done. Thanks also to our hand quilters, many expressed surprise that so many of our quilts were hand quilted.

Judy McWhirter and her staff at the BCC were wonderful and helped us out in many ways.

Kudos to Roger and Bill for dealing with all our wishes and demands. I must also congratulate Ross Fitchett and his band of merry men and lady who kept the cars in line. Thanks, guys!

Lastly congratulations to all those who entered quilts and quilted items in the show. They were absolutely beautiful and you should be very proud. That is the crux of our show, to show others what we are about and what we can do. This was our show and we showed them!



Funeral by Rev. Andrew Harold Borchardt and Pastor Mike Peckling (St. Paul's).



Attic Window made By Joyce Ross for a friend who has since passed and will be presented to his wife after the show.


