


BAQG News

Quilt Camp 2024

This year's Quilt Camp was another resounding success! The children, aged 10-16, were introduced to the fundamentals of quilting. Each child made a 10 block sampler quilt from traditional blocks while learning the names and historical background of each block. Every one of this year's students was able to make the blocks, piece the top together, sandwich the quilt, machine quilt and machine bind their quilt.

The students were taught the importance of making and attaching a label to the back of their quilt.

Each student went home with a booklet that included all the block patterns as well as other tips and information about quilting.

This could not have been accomplished without the help of our volunteers: Sue T, Martha W, Kathy M, Laurie P and Jaime W, a returning camper about to start on her post secondary education.

The quilts will be on display at our Quilting at the Lakes quilt show in September 2025.

Library News from Ann B

It's fun starting a new year in the library as we have a whole new budget to work with. Cheryl W has joined me and I think we make a great team.

We are continuing to have books for sale at the weekly sew days on Wednesdays, as well as at the monthly meetings. All money goes back into the library for new books.

Speaking of new books, we have had some requests and have branched out a little into more handwork as that's what we're all doing on Wednesdays. Embroidery, cross-stitch and Sashiko are becoming more and more popular. **Carol Doak's "Show Me How to Paper Piece"** is one of the new books. It makes it look so easy!

Books aren't the only items in our library. We have a list of specialty rulers that members are willing to lend out (and are always on the lookout for more) and a library of quilting stencils (as well as several quilting template books). These are in a big fabric folder behind the wall in the Church as they don't fit on the library shelves.

Don't forget that we also have a GO Accuquilt Cutter. It has an 8" block mix and match, and also a 2 1/2" strip cutter. There are also templates for a pick-up truck and a camper. This is available to borrow from Gloria Curry, who originally purchased it all.

All the sign out sheets and lists are in the front of the blue library sign out book.

We would also like to remind you to return books within a month unless you are actively using them in order to give other members a chance to look at them.

Mystical Celtic designs created with only two simple blocks, building grids and options, color temperature/value/transparency/texture/inspiration, templates, with patterns

A very clear how-to with great diagrams and top tips for preparing shapes, placing and layering, unit appliqué, stitch sampler, perfect corners/ curves/points, bias stems/vines/ basket handles, stained glass appliqué, Electric Mola, spray starch and Templar appliqué, freezer paper, folk art, dimensional, reverse, cutwork, gallery

The guides shared the history and background of each quilt, including one by Alice Williams, a local quilter well-known to many of our guild members.

Sample Quilt Workshops

Judy Darke will be offering a series of workshops to make a sampler quilt. There will be five one day workshops altogether. The techniques will include perfect points, triangles, flying geese, paper piecing with freezer paper, machine applique, working with curves, cathedral windows, a 3D windmill block, and of course, squaring!

Two blocks will be assembled and machine quilted in each workshop. There will be a different idea to quilt each block using a walking foot, and/or free motion. You will learn nine or ten ideas for machine quilting. On the last workshop day you will learn to assemble your blocks using a quilt-as-you go method using sashing.

This workshop is suitable for everyone You may be a beginner quilter (and I will give you extra help on Wednesday mornings if you want it). Or you may be a confident quilter who wants to practice machine quilting, or learn the quilt-as-you-go method using sashing. Or you may want to take the workshops "just because"...
